In this book, Willis shows that okra is an important ingredient in cuisines across the United States, Africa, Asia, and Latin America. Okra features gardening tips, a discussion of heirloom varieties, and expert cooking directions. The title also features 50 unique recipes.

Twitty travels from the tobacco and rice farms of colonial times to plantation kitchens and backbreaking cotton fields to tell of the struggles his family faced and how food enabled his ancestors' survival across three centuries.

The Potlikker Papers: A Food History of the Modern South by John T. Edge (eBook on Overdrive)
